UNDERSTANDING ENVIRONMENTAL ECONOMICS

THESE SYSTEMS ALLOW COMPANIES TO BUY AND SELL EMISSION ALLOWANCES, CREATING A FINANCIAL INCENTIVE TO REDUCE POLLUTION. BY CAPPING THE TOTAL LEVEL OF EMISSIONS AND ALLOWING THE MARKET TO DETERMINE THE PRICE OF PERMITS, THESE SYSTEMS CAN ACHIEVE ENVIRONMENTAL GOALS AT A LOWER COST COMPARED TO DIRECT REGULATION.

EXTERNALITIES AND PUBLIC GOODS

EXTERNALITIES OCCUR WHEN THE ACTIONS OF INDIVIDUALS OR FIRMS HAVE UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCES ON THIRD PARTIES. IN ENVIRONMENTAL CONTEXTS, NEGATIVE EXTERNALITIES, SUCH AS POLLUTION, CAN LEAD TO SIGNIFICANT SOCIETAL COSTS THAT ARE NOT REFLECTED IN MARKET PRICES. UNDERSTANDING EXTERNALITIES IS FUNDAMENTAL TO DEVELOPING EFFECTIVE ENVIRONMENTAL POLICIES.

TYPES OF EXTERNALITIES

- **NEGATIVE EXTERNALITIES:** THESE ARISE WHEN THE PRODUCTION OR CONSUMPTION OF GOODS IMPOSES COSTS ON OTHERS, SUCH AS AIR AND WATER POLLUTION.
- **POSITIVE EXTERNALITIES:** THESE OCCUR WHEN THE BENEFITS OF A GOOD SPILL OVER TO OTHERS, SUCH AS THE SOCIAL BENEFITS OF REFORESTATION.

PUBLIC GOODS, WHICH ARE NON-EXCLUDABLE AND NON-RIVALROUS, ALSO PLAY A KEY ROLE IN ENVIRONMENTAL ECONOMICS. CLEAN AIR, BIODIVERSITY, AND STABLE CLIMATE SYSTEMS ARE EXAMPLES OF PUBLIC GOODS THAT REQUIRE COLLECTIVE ACTION AND INVESTMENT TO MAINTAIN. THE CHALLENGE LIES IN INCENTIVIZING CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE PROVISION OF PUBLIC GOODS, AS INDIVIDUAL INTERESTS MAY CONFLICT WITH COLLECTIVE NEEDS.

VALUATION OF ECOSYSTEM SERVICES
