

ENVIRONMENTAL ECONOMICS DEFINITION

ENVIRONMENTAL ECONOMICS DEFINITION IS A FIELD OF STUDY THAT EXPLORES THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN ECONOMIC ACTIVITY AND THE ENVIRONMENT. PUBLIC GOODS

PUBLIC GOODS ARE RESOURCES THAT ARE NON-EXCLUDABLE AND NON-RIVALROUS, MEANING THAT ONE PERSON'S CONSUMPTION DOES NOT DIMINISH ANOTHER'S ABILITY TO CONSUME. ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES, SUCH AS CLEAN AIR AND BIODIVERSITY, ARE OFTEN CONSIDERED PUBLIC GOODS. THIS CLASSIFICATION PRESENTS CHALLENGES FOR ECONOMIC VALUATION AND INCENTIVIZING CONSERVATION, AS THEY ARE TYPICALLY UNDERFUNDED IN A MARKET ECONOMY.

MARKET FAILURES
