UNDERSTANDING THE AREA MODEL

COMPONENTS OF THE AREA MODEL

THIS LAYOUT ALLOWS FOR THE DECOMPOSITION OF NUMBERS INTO THEIR PLACE VALUES, FACILITATING EASIER CALCULATIONS.

AREA REPRESENTATION

THE AREA WITHIN THE GRID IS CALCULATED BY MULTIPLYING THE DIMENSIONS OF EACH SECTION. EACH SECTION'S AREA CORRESPONDS TO A PARTIAL PRODUCT THAT CONTRIBUTES TO THE OVERALL PRODUCT. APPLICATIONS OF THE AREA MODEL IN MATH

WE THEN CALCULATE THE AREA OF EACH SECTION:

- $20 \times 40 = 800$
- $20 \times 5 = 100$
- $3 \times 40 = 120$
- $3 \times 5 = 15$

FINALLY, WE SUM THESE AREAS: $800 + 100 + 120 + 15 = 1035$. THUS, $23 \times 45 = 1035$.

EXAMPLE 2: DIVIDING USING THE AREA MODEL

LET'S TAKE A DIVISION EXAMPLE: $84 \div 4$. USING THE AREA MODEL, WE CAN VISUALIZE HOW MANY GROUPS OF 4 FIT INTO 84.

WE CAN SET UP A GRID WHERE ONE SIDE REPRESENTS THE TOTAL AREA (84) AND THE OTHER REPRESENTS THE SIZE OF EACH GROUP (4). BY CREATING SECTIONS THAT FIT INTO 84, WE CAN SEE THAT:

- 4 FITS INTO 84 A TOTAL OF 21 TIMES.

THEREFORE, $84 \div 4 = 21$, WHICH CAN BE CONFIRMED BY VISUALIZING THE DIVISION ON THE GRID.

HOW TO TEACH THE AREA MODEL EFFECTIVELY

TEACHING THE AREA MODEL REQUIRES A STEP-BY-STEP APPROACH TO ENSURE STUDENTS GRASP THE CONCEPT FULLY. HERE ARE SOME EFFECTIVE STRATEGIES:
