## UNITS OF MEASUREMENT

IN PHARMACY, YOU'LL ENCOUNTER VARIOUS UNITS OF MEASUREMENT FOR WEIGHT, VOLUME, AND TEMPERATURE. THE METRIC SYSTEM IS THE MOST PREVALENT, USING GRAMS (G), MILLIGRAMS (MG), MICROGRAMS (MCG) FOR WEIGHT, AND LITERS (L), MILLILITERS (ML) FOR VOLUME. THE IMPERIAL SYSTEM, STILL USED FOR SOME MEDICATIONS AND DEVICES, INCLUDES OUNCES (OZ), POUNDS (LB), PINTS, AND QUARTS. RECOGNIZING THESE AND KNOWING THEIR EQUIVALENTS IS CRUCIAL FOR ACCURATE CONVERSIONS. FOR EXAMPLE, UNDERSTANDING THAT 1 GRAM IS EQUAL TO 1000 MILLIGRAMS CAN PREVENT SIGNIFICANT DOSAGE ERRORS.

## PHARMACY ABBREVIATIONS AND SYMBOLS

THE PHARMACY WORLD IS RIFE WITH ABBREVIATIONS AND SYMBOLS THAT DENOTE SPECIFIC QUANTITIES, FREQUENCIES, OR ROUTES OF ADMINISTRATION. COMMON ONES INCLUDE 'GTT' FOR DROPS, 'TSP' FOR TEASPOON, 'TBSP' FOR TABLESPOON, 'AC' FOR BEFORE MEALS, AND 'PC' FOR AFTER MEALS. MISINTERPRETING THESE CAN LEAD TO DISPENSING THE WRONG AMOUNT OR FREQUENCY. ALWAYS DOUBLE-CHECK PRESCRIPTIONS FOR CLARITY AND CONSULT A PHARMACIST IF ANY ABBREVIATION IS UNCLEAR. YOUR ABILITY TO DECIPHER THESE SHORTHAND NOTATIONS ACCURATELY DIRECTLY IMPACTS PATIENT SAFETY.

# DOSAGE CALCULATIONS: THE HEART OF PHARMACY MATH

DOSAGE CALCULATIONS ARE ARGUABLY THE MOST CRITICAL ASPECT OF A PHARMACY TECHNICIAN'S MATHEMATICAL RESPONSIBILITIES. ENSURING PATIENTS RECEIVE THE CORRECT AMOUNT OF MEDICATION IS PARAMOUNT, AND EVEN MINOR ERRORS CAN HAVE SERIOUS CONSEQUENCES. THESE PROBLEMS OFTEN INVOLVE DETERMINING THE QUANTITY OF A DRUG TO ADMINISTER BASED ON THE PRESCRIBED DOSE, THE CONCENTRATION OF THE AVAILABLE MEDICATION, AND THE PATIENT'S WEIGHT OR BODY SURFACE AREA. PRACTICE IS KEY HERE; THE MORE YOU DO, THE MORE INTUITIVE THESE CALCULATIONS BECOME.

## WEIGHT-BASED DOSING

MANY MEDICATIONS, ESPECIALLY IN PEDIATRICS AND FOR CERTAIN CRITICAL CARE DRUGS, ARE DOSED BASED ON A PATIENT'S WEIGHT. THE PRESCRIPTION MIGHT STATE A DOSE PER KILOGRAM (MG/KG) OR PER POUND (MG/LB). YOUR TASK IS TO CALCULATE THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF THE DRUG NEEDED FOR THAT SPECIFIC PATIENT. THIS INVOLVES A STRAIGHTFORWARD MULTIPLICATION PROBLEM ONCE YOU'VE ENSURED YOUR UNITS ARE CONSISTENT. FOR INSTANCE, IF A CHILD NEEDS 5 MG/KG AND WEIGHS 25 KG, THE TOTAL DOSE IS  $5 \text{ MG/KG} \times 25 \text{ KG} = 125 \text{ MG}$ .

## VOLUME-BASED DOSING (LIQUIDS)

FOR LIQUID MEDICATIONS, DOSAGE CALCULATIONS FOCUS ON THE VOLUME TO BE ADMINISTERED. THIS IS COMMON FOR ORAL SOLUTIONS, SUSPENSIONS, AND INJECTABLES. YOU'LL OFTEN BE GIVEN THE CONCENTRATION OF THE MEDICATION (E.G., 100 MG PER 5 mL) AND THE DESIRED DOSE IN MILLIGRAMS. THE GOAL IS TO FIND THE VOLUME IN MILLILITERS THAT CONTAINS THE CORRECT MILLIGRAM AMOUNT. A COMMON APPROACH HERE IS USING THE FORMULA:  $(\text{DESIRED DOSE} / \text{CONCENTRATION}) \times \text{VOLUME} = \text{AMOUNT TO DISPENSE}$ . OR, IN OUR EXAMPLE:  $(\text{DESIRED DOSE IN MG} / 100 \text{ MG}) \times 5 \text{ mL} = \text{VOLUME TO DISPENSE}$ .

## CALCULATING NUMBER OF DOSES

SOMETIMES, YOU'LL NEED TO DETERMINE HOW MANY DOSES CAN BE PREPARED FROM A LARGER QUANTITY OF MEDICATION OR HOW MANY DOSES ARE IN A PRESCRIPTION. THIS INVOLVES DIVIDING THE TOTAL AVAILABLE AMOUNT BY THE SINGLE DOSE AMOUNT. FOR EXAMPLE, IF YOU HAVE 500 mL OF A LIQUID MEDICATION AND EACH DOSE IS 10 mL, YOU CAN PROVIDE  $500 \text{ mL} / 10 \text{ mL} = 50$  DOSES. THIS IS CRUCIAL FOR INVENTORY MANAGEMENT AND PATIENT COUNSELING REGARDING THE DURATION OF TREATMENT.

## RATIO AND PROPORTION PROBLEMS IN PHARMACY

RATIOS AND PROPORTIONS ARE FUNDAMENTAL MATHEMATICAL CONCEPTS THAT APPEAR FREQUENTLY IN PHARMACY CALCULATIONS, PARTICULARLY IN AREAS LIKE DILUTIONS AND PREPARING STOCK SOLUTIONS. A RATIO COMPARES TWO QUANTITIES, WHILE A PROPORTION STATES THAT TWO RATIOS ARE EQUAL. UNDERSTANDING THESE RELATIONSHIPS ALLOWS YOU TO ACCURATELY SCALE UP OR DOWN CONCENTRATIONS AND ENSURE CONSISTENCY.

## USING RATIOS FOR DILUTIONS

WHEN PREPARING A WEAKER SOLUTION FROM A CONCENTRATED STOCK SOLUTION, RATIOS ARE ESSENTIAL. FOR EXAMPLE, A PRESCRIPTION MIGHT CALL FOR A 1:10 DILUTION OF A DISINFECTANT. THIS MEANS FOR EVERY 1 PART OF DISINFECTANT, YOU NEED 10 PARTS OF THE DILUENT (OFTEN WATER). IF YOU NEED TO MAKE 100 mL OF THE DILUTED SOLUTION, YOU'D USE 10 mL OF THE DISINFECTANT AND 90 mL OF THE DILUENT. IT'S ABOUT MAINTAINING THAT PRECISE PROPORTIONAL RELATIONSHIP.

## CROSS-MULTIPLICATION WITH PROPORTIONS

PROPORTIONS ARE OFTEN SOLVED USING CROSS-MULTIPLICATION. IF YOU HAVE A KNOWN RATIO AND AN UNKNOWN QUANTITY WITHIN A PROPORTIONAL RELATIONSHIP, YOU CAN SET UP AN EQUATION. FOR INSTANCE, IF 5 MG OF A DRUG IS IN 10 mL OF SOLUTION, HOW MANY mL (X) WILL CONTAIN 20 MG? YOU CAN SET UP THE PROPORTION:  $5 \text{ MG} / 10 \text{ mL} = 20 \text{ MG} / x \text{ mL}$ . CROSS-MULTIPLYING GIVES YOU  $5x = 200$ , SO  $x = 40 \text{ mL}$ . THIS METHOD IS INCREDIBLY VERSATILE FOR MANY PHARMACY CALCULATIONS.

## UNIT CONVERSIONS: BRIDGING DIFFERENT MEASUREMENT SYSTEMS

THE ABILITY TO SEAMLESSLY CONVERT BETWEEN DIFFERENT UNITS OF MEASUREMENT IS A NON-NEGOTIABLE SKILL FOR PHARMACY TECHNICIANS. YOU'LL CONSTANTLY BE TRANSLATING BETWEEN THE METRIC SYSTEM, THE IMPERIAL SYSTEM, AND SOMETIMES EVEN APOTHECARY UNITS. ACCURATE CONVERSIONS ENSURE THAT MEDICATIONS ARE MEASURED PRECISELY, REGARDLESS OF THE SYSTEM SPECIFIED ON THE PRESCRIPTION OR THE AVAILABLE STOCK. THINK OF CONVERSION FACTORS AS YOUR ROSETTA STONE FOR PHARMACY MATH.

### METRIC TO METRIC CONVERSIONS

CONVERTING WITHIN THE METRIC SYSTEM INVOLVES UNDERSTANDING PREFIXES LIKE MILLI-, MICRO-, CENTI-, AND KILO-. FOR EXAMPLE, TO CONVERT MILLIGRAMS TO GRAMS, YOU DIVIDE BY 1000 (SINCE  $1 \text{ g} = 1000 \text{ mg}$ ). TO CONVERT GRAMS TO MILLIGRAMS, YOU MULTIPLY BY 1000. MOVING THE DECIMAL POINT IS OFTEN THE EASIEST WAY TO DO THIS: MOVING THREE PLACES TO THE LEFT FOR MG TO G, AND THREE PLACES TO THE RIGHT FOR G TO MG. THIS APPLIES ACROSS WEIGHT (MG, G, KG) AND VOLUME (ML, L).

### IMPERIAL TO METRIC AND VICE VERSA

CONVERSIONS BETWEEN IMPERIAL AND METRIC UNITS REQUIRE SPECIFIC CONVERSION FACTORS THAT YOU'LL NEED TO MEMORIZE OR HAVE READILY ACCESSIBLE. COMMON CONVERSIONS INCLUDE:  $1 \text{ inch} = 2.54 \text{ cm}$ ,  $1 \text{ kg} \approx 2.2 \text{ lb}$ ,  $1 \text{ L} \approx 33.8 \text{ fl oz}$ ,  $1 \text{ fl oz} \approx 29.57 \text{ mL}$ ,  $1 \text{ tsp} \approx 5 \text{ mL}$ , AND  $1 \text{ tbsp} \approx 15 \text{ mL}$ . WHEN PERFORMING THESE CONVERSIONS, IT'S OFTEN BEST TO SET UP A DIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS PROBLEM TO ENSURE YOU DON'T INVERT YOUR CONVERSION FACTOR, WHICH WOULD LEAD TO AN INCORRECT ANSWER.

## ALLIGATION: BLENDING INGREDIENTS TO ACHIEVE A DESIRED STRENGTH

ALLIGATION, SPECIFICALLY THE METHOD OF ALLIGATION MEDIAL, IS A POWERFUL TOOL FOR CALCULATING THE AMOUNTS OF TWO SOLUTIONS OF DIFFERENT STRENGTHS NEEDED TO CREATE A MIXTURE OF A DESIRED INTERMEDIATE STRENGTH. THIS IS FREQUENTLY USED WHEN PREPARING CUSTOM COMPOUNDED MEDICATIONS OR WHEN DILUTING HIGH-CONCENTRATION SOLUTIONS TO A SPECIFIC PERCENTAGE. IT'S A SYSTEMATIC APPROACH THAT HELPS AVOID COMPLEX ALGEBRAIC EQUATIONS.

### THE ALLIGATION GRID EXPLAINED

THE ALLIGATION GRID INVOLVES DRAWING A SQUARE. IN THE TOP LEFT CORNER, YOU PLACE THE DESIRED PERCENTAGE OR STRENGTH. IN THE BOTTOM LEFT CORNER, YOU PLACE THE LOWER PERCENTAGE OR STRENGTH. IN THE TOP RIGHT CORNER, YOU PLACE THE HIGHER PERCENTAGE OR STRENGTH. THEN, YOU SUBTRACT DIAGONALLY ACROSS THE SQUARE, PLACING THE RESULT IN THE OPPOSITE CORNER. THE DIFFERENCE YOU GET IN THE BOTTOM RIGHT CORNER REPRESENTS THE PARTS OF THE HIGHER

STRENGTH SOLUTION, AND THE DIFFERENCE IN THE TOP RIGHT CORNER REPRESENTS THE PARTS OF THE LOWER STRENGTH SOLUTION NEEDED. THESE PARTS CAN THEN BE USED TO CALCULATE THE EXACT VOLUMES REQUIRED.

## APPLYING ALLIGATION TO PHARMACY SCENARIOS

IMAGINE YOU NEED TO CREATE 1000 mL OF A 30% SOLUTION USING A 50% STOCK SOLUTION AND A 10% SOLUTION. YOU'D PLACE 30 IN THE TOP LEFT, 10 IN THE BOTTOM LEFT, AND 50 IN THE TOP RIGHT. SUBTRACTING DIAGONALLY:  $50 - 30 = 20$  (PARTS OF THE 10% SOLUTION) AND  $30 - 10 = 20$  (PARTS OF THE 50% SOLUTION). SO, YOU NEED 20 PARTS OF THE 10% SOLUTION AND 20 PARTS OF THE 50% SOLUTION. SINCE THE TOTAL PARTS ARE 40, YOU'D USE  $(20/40) 1000 \text{ mL} = 500 \text{ mL}$  OF THE 10% SOLUTION AND  $(20/40) 1000 \text{ mL} = 500 \text{ mL}$  OF THE 50% SOLUTION. THIS ENSURES YOUR FINAL MIXTURE HAS THE EXACT 30% CONCENTRATION.

## FLOW RATE CALCULATIONS FOR IV INFUSIONS

INTRAVENOUS (IV) INFUSIONS REQUIRE PRECISE CALCULATIONS TO ENSURE MEDICATIONS ARE DELIVERED AT THE CORRECT RATE. PHARMACY TECHNICIANS ARE OFTEN INVOLVED IN PREPARING IV ADMIXTURES AND UNDERSTANDING THE CALCULATIONS ASSOCIATED WITH THEIR ADMINISTRATION. THIS INCLUDES DETERMINING THE DRIP RATE (DROPS PER MINUTE) OR THE INFUSION RATE IN MILLILITERS PER HOUR.

### CALCULATING DROPS PER MINUTE (GTTS/MIN)

WHEN AN IV SET DELIVERS MEDICATION IN DROPS, YOU NEED TO CALCULATE THE RATE IN DROPS PER MINUTE. THE FORMULA IS:  $(\text{TOTAL VOLUME TO INFUSE} / \text{TOTAL TIME IN MINUTES}) \times \text{DROP FACTOR} = \text{DROPS PER MINUTE}$ . THE DROP FACTOR IS A CONSTANT SPECIFIC TO THE IV TUBING BEING USED (E.G., 10 GTTS/mL, 15 GTTS/mL, 20 GTTS/mL). FOR EXAMPLE, IF YOU NEED TO INFUSE 1000 mL OVER 8 HOURS USING A 15 GTTS/mL TUBING, YOU FIRST CONVERT HOURS TO MINUTES ( $8 \text{ HOURS} \times 60 \text{ MINUTES/HOUR} = 480 \text{ MINUTES}$ ). THEN, THE CALCULATION IS  $(1000 \text{ mL} / 480 \text{ MIN}) \times 15 \text{ GTTS/mL} = 31.25 \text{ GTTS/MIN}$ , WHICH IS TYPICALLY ROUNDED TO 31 OR 32 GTTS/MIN.

### CALCULATING MILLILITERS PER HOUR (mL/HR)

THIS IS A MORE COMMON CALCULATION FOR AUTOMATED INFUSION PUMPS. THE FORMULA IS STRAIGHTFORWARD:  $\text{TOTAL VOLUME TO INFUSE} / \text{TOTAL TIME IN HOURS} = \text{MILLILITERS PER HOUR}$ . IF YOU NEED TO INFUSE 500 mL OVER 4 HOURS, THE CALCULATION IS SIMPLY  $500 \text{ mL} / 4 \text{ HOURS} = 125 \text{ mL/HR}$ . THIS IS OFTEN THE PRIMARY SETTING YOU'LL INPUT INTO AN IV PUMP.

## TIPS AND STRATEGIES FOR TACKLING PHARMACY MATH PROBLEMS

- **IDENTIFY THE GOAL:** WHAT IS THE FINAL ANSWER YOU NEED TO FIND? WHAT UNITS SHOULD IT BE IN?

- **CHOOSE THE RIGHT FORMULA OR METHOD:** SELECT THE CALCULATION TECHNIQUE THAT BEST SUITS THE PROBLEM.
- **USE DIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS:** THIS IS AN INVALUABLE TOOL FOR ENSURING UNITS CANCEL OUT CORRECTLY AND THAT YOU'RE PERFORMING THE RIGHT OPERATIONS.
- **WRITE DOWN ALL STEPS:** EVEN FOR SIMPLE PROBLEMS, SHOWING YOUR WORK CAN HELP YOU CATCH ERRORS AND MAKES IT EASIER TO RETRACE YOUR STEPS IF NEEDED.
- **DOUBLE-CHECK YOUR WORK:** IF TIME PERMITS, RECALCULATE THE PROBLEM OR HAVE A COLLEAGUE REVIEW IT.
- **KNOW YOUR CONVERSION FACTORS:** KEEP A CHEAT SHEET HANDY FOR COMMON CONVERSIONS, ESPECIALLY WHEN STARTING OUT.
- **ESTIMATE YOUR ANSWER:** BEFORE DOING THE EXACT CALCULATION, MAKE A ROUGH ESTIMATE OF WHAT THE ANSWER SHOULD BE. THIS CAN HELP YOU SPOT WILDLY INCORRECT RESULTS.
- **BE FAMILIAR WITH COMMON DRUG CONCENTRATIONS AND DOSAGES:** EXPERIENCE WILL BUILD YOUR INTUITION FOR WHAT IS A REASONABLE AMOUNT.

A: PROFICIENCY IN MATH IS CRITICAL FOR PHARMACY TECHNICIANS TO ENSURE ACCURATE MEDICATION DISPENSING, CALCULATE CORRECT DOSAGES, PREPARE ACCURATE SOLUTIONS, AND PREVENT MEDICATION ERRORS, ALL OF WHICH DIRECTLY IMPACT

### **Q: WHAT IS THE BEST STRATEGY FOR SOLVING RATIO AND PROPORTION PROBLEMS IN PHARMACY?**

A: THE MOST EFFECTIVE STRATEGY FOR SOLVING RATIO AND PROPORTION PROBLEMS IS OFTEN USING DIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS OR SETTING UP PROPORTIONS AND SOLVING THEM VIA CROSS-MULTIPLICATION. THIS ENSURES THAT UNITS CANCEL CORRECTLY AND THE CALCULATION IS LOGICAL.

### **Q: HOW CAN I IMPROVE MY SPEED AND ACCURACY WHEN DOING PHARMACY MATH?**

A: CONSISTENT PRACTICE IS KEY. REGULARLY WORK THROUGH VARIOUS TYPES OF PROBLEMS, USE FLASHCARDS FOR CONVERSION FACTORS, AND FAMILIARIZE YOURSELF WITH COMMON CALCULATIONS. DOUBLE-CHECKING YOUR WORK AND ESTIMATING ANSWERS BEFORE CALCULATING CAN ALSO ENHANCE ACCURACY AND SPEED.

### **Q: ARE THERE SPECIFIC PHARMACY ABBREVIATIONS I SHOULD MEMORIZE FOR MATH PROBLEMS?**

A: YES, IT'S CRUCIAL TO MEMORIZE ABBREVIATIONS RELATED TO MEASUREMENTS AND QUANTITIES, SUCH AS mL (MILLILITER), L (LITER), MG (MILLIGRAM), G (GRAM), MCG (MICROGRAM), TSP (TEASPOON), TBSP (TABLESPOON), OZ (OUNCE), AND GTTS (DROPS).

### **Q: WHAT IS ALLIGATION, AND WHEN IS IT USED IN PHARMACY?**

A: ALLIGATION IS A METHOD USED TO CALCULATE THE QUANTITIES OF TWO SOLUTIONS OF DIFFERENT CONCENTRATIONS NEEDED TO CREATE A MIXTURE WITH A DESIRED INTERMEDIATE CONCENTRATION. IT'S COMMONLY USED IN COMPOUNDING AND PREPARING SPECIFIC DILUTIONS.

### **Q: HOW DO I CONVERT BETWEEN METRIC AND IMPERIAL UNITS FOR MEDICATIONS?**

A: YOU'LL NEED TO USE SPECIFIC CONVERSION FACTORS. FOR EXAMPLE,  $1 \text{ kg} \approx 2.2 \text{ lbs}$ ,  $1 \text{ inch} = 2.54 \text{ cm}$ , AND  $1 \text{ fl oz} \approx 29.57 \text{ mL}$ . IT'S BEST TO USE DIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS TO ENSURE ACCURATE CONVERSION.

### **Q: WHAT IS A "DROP FACTOR" IN IV FLOW RATE CALCULATIONS?**

A: A DROP FACTOR REFERS TO THE NUMBER OF DROPS DELIVERED BY A SPECIFIC TYPE OF IV TUBING TO MAKE ONE MILLILITER OF FLUID. THIS FACTOR IS ESSENTIAL FOR CALCULATING THE DRIP RATE IN DROPS PER MINUTE.

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
